"I would have loved it if someone had taught me the business side of this industry before I had to go out and learn it for myself," he adds.

Derrick will be one of the Academy's master teachers at the Bricktown-based campus, contributing to a hands-on, flexible curriculum that includes the business management, performance and production areas of the music industry.

Derrick's inclusion in the ACM originated with its executive director, Scott Booker, manager of The Flaming Lips.

Booker, a fellow UCO alumnus, approached Derrick, who will serve as a spokesperson for the program. Derrick's single "The Other Side of Five" is the featured song on a promotional DVD the ACM will send to thousands of U.S. high schools this spring to promote enrollment, which concludes in June.

Not surprisingly, student interest in the ACM has been significant, and the Academy's location in Bricktown bodes well for the district's entertainment possibilities in the months and years to come.
